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A Word From Our Rabbi

Accompanying the Revelation



This year, between the evening of Thursday, May 28, and the conclusion of Shabbat, Saturday evening, May 30, we celebrate our festival of Shavuot. Traditionally, as you know, the period of the Omer, the counting of the days between Pesach and Shavuot begins on the second evening of Passover, which in this year occurred on Thursday evening, April 9. At that time, we were very much in the process of another counting unique to this year – the counting of the days of “sheltering in place” during our national shutdown. We were also at the same time waiting for a different kind of revelation already – the revealing of information and instruction, guidance and teaching, a “secular” Torah if you will, on how to proceed with our lives and begin to return to a “new normal”, however we will come to understand what that means.

During Shavuot, we recall how the mountain seemed to “thunder” and be ablaze with fire; awesome signs that both terrified and captivated the Israelites. During our time, we witnessed the terrifying tenacity and transmissive power of the Coronavirus, literally threatening so many lives. It is only by following the instructions of caution and care given to us, much as Moses communicated safety warnings to the ancient Israelites, that we are surviving and becoming able to survive this crisis, which will have ramifications for years ahead. Just as crucial concepts of caring, community, and solidarity were communicated by Moses to our forebears, we now appreciate those qualities in new ways, and will continue to affirm their relevance.

Our “new normal” will likely reflect our new learning- learning which we did not invite or seek out prior to needing to, but which now becomes part of our social and cultural history and experience. We now have a wider and more complex understanding of such terms as “containment,” “mitigation,” “social distancing,” “sheltering in place,” and “virtual”. To our credit, we have continued to embrace so many of the same ideals which accompanied our revelation at Sinai, whose principles of reverence and respect for God and each other, compassion for all in need, recognition of human limitation and frailty, and the bridge connecting the Human and the Divine, will continue to reverberate for all generations.

B'Yachad Religious School

The show must go on!! As an educator and teacher, we took on this role to share our love of Judaism, the tradition, customs, and rituals no matter what roadblocks we encounter. Religious school educators throughout Palm Beach have been working together collaborating and sharing ideas, programs, and thoughts. Our teachers and I have worked endless hours throughout Spring Break learning how to utilize virtual classrooms to our advantage. We came up with programs, projects and new teaching techniques to continue our Religious School education and transition into the “new normal.”

The B'Yachad Religious School is happy to share that we have transitioned to online virtual learning and teaching and have enjoyed interacting with our students. Many of our teachers are so happy to interact and see the smiling faces of our students. Our attendance rate has been surprisingly high with approximately 65-70% of our students participating in these sessions. Our students are happy, our parents are happy, and our teachers are happy. The students are smiling as they learn to make matzah, discuss Passover rituals, and share how this year is “different from all other years.” They have been studying prayers, learning about Israel and the Holocaust, and will begin their virtual Hebrew curriculum this week.

Being visible and sharing experiences is the main objective of virtual learning, so as a result, we have included Shabbat B'Yachad as a weekly get together with our families. We have the opportunity to bring in Shabbat together virtually with many of our Religious School families. Each week three families volunteer to lead the program by giving us a Shabbat greeting, light candles, and recite Kiddush. It is a wonderful treat to start Shabbat together.

With only one month left of Religious School, we want to keep many of our B'Yachad traditions going, so our classes will each have their own end of year moments. Our 7th grade students will still have the opportunity to share their essays and thoughts about “what makes religion special to them,” and we will still attempt to put together a slide show that we will share with the families. Each of these may take a little more time and energy on the staff, but we will make this happen and provide our families with memories of their year.

It takes a village to make this happen, so I want to thank both synagogue boards, presidents, education committee chairs, teachers, parents and most of all, the students for your support, cooperation and understanding in helping us to realize the great things we can do for our families during this difficult time of uncertainty. I truly hope that we will see a “different” normal very soon.

With all this said, let me remind you that with summer comes new school registration, so be on the lookout for new registration forms for the upcoming year and take advantage of any “early bird” incentives we have to offer.

I look forward to continuing to learn with you all and to share all the wonderful programs that B'Yachad has to offer you and your families.

TEMPLE TORAT EMET SCRIP CARDS FUNDRAISING PROGRAM

The Scrip, or Gift Card program, began just before Pesach and has been very well received by our congregation. Over 60 families have participated by purchasing gift cards from our local Jewish supermarkets - Glicks, Aroma, and The Grove - as well as Winn Dixie, CVS, Walgreens, and Target.

For the holidays, we introduced Dunkin Donuts and sold out within a few days! Additionally, members bought a variety of gift cards from shopwithscrip.com, the web site anyone can access to over 750 nation-wide retail outlets, to further this fundraising effort.

Currently, our members and friends have bought over \$35,000 in gift cards, providing our shul with over \$3,000 in additional income. A hearty Yashar Koach to us all!

We've only scratched the surface in this fundraising effort. If every participating family introduced the Scrip program to one friend, we could double our fundraising revenue. If those new people did the same, and it continued, our synagogue could realize upward of \$25,000 or more in income.

HIP Program

The 2019-2020 Marvin and Sheila Hurwitz Teen HIP Educational program came to an abrupt end, as we had to cancel the last two sessions for our teens. With that said, our class of 36 students were saddened but understood the reasons and look forward to continuing their sessions next year. Our attendance record this past year was the highest in 5 years of the class. Each year we ask the graduating seniors to reflect on their experiences in a short essay.

Rebecca Chassin who joined as a Freshman 4 years ago, says it best **“HIP is not like any other Hebrew class. You are able to speak your mind without judgement from anyone else. The topics are interesting and can be integrated into daily life.”**

The program, led and developed by Andy Greenberg sums the program up best by stating; “The students are actively participating in intense discussions as they are evaluating Jewish thought, traditions, Torah and Talmud, ethics, environment, holidays, Israel, history, G-d and prayer to understand how these are relevant to their current and future lives. To many, it is the first time that they've been exposed to a classroom environment that invites opposing opinions and challenging thoughts. This year’s goal was Bringing Jewish Education to Life. I like to think that Kindergarten through 7th grade classes prepares a student for HIP!

Chassin goes on to say **“It is important to stay connected to my religion as a young Jew. As I graduate from high school and shortly start my college journey, I am excited to become an active participant with Hillel. I am eager to travel to Israel on Birthright like my sister Blake. I recognize the importance of participating in Jewish learning and activities to ensure our religion and traditions prevail.”** Rebecca’s oldest sister graduated last year and he younger brother just completed his second year.

The students are amazed how far Judaism goes beyond their early Jewish education that emphasized structure through prayer and Hebrew as well as holiday observances. Their sense of discovery that Judaism is a lifestyle that has contributed to the beneficial advancement of society in general and Jewish growth and survival in particular sometimes leaves them with a sense of disbelief and yet taking pride in how their Jewish identity is being strengthened.

Another student shared some great insight for the future students that will walk through the doors of our program; Parker Luka, who started 5 years ago as a 7th grader sums it up so well “ **I recommend to the new students that you come in the HIP program with an open mind. My experience while I was in the HIP program exceeded my expectations greatly. When I used to go to Hebrew school, it made me feel like the whole point of going through Hebrew school was to prepare you for your Bar/Bat mitzvah and missing the aspect of actually teaching these Jewish students about real Judaism, But the HIP program filled in just what I was missing from Hebrew school. In the future I am going to carry down the Jewish tradition to my kids because I want them to know where they came from and the suffering Jewish people experienced but soon turned it into a positive.**” Parker’s younger brother just completed his second year.

The number of referrals each year continues to be impressive which translates into the fact that the students feel not only is the program beneficial to them but also to other teens as well. it is for this reason that we are grateful that Temple Torat Emet and the Foundation continues to support this vital part of Jewish education and we look forward to sharing this positive experience with more teens in the distant future. Once we can realize what the future will “actually look like, we look forward to sharing registration forms to our current students and to students entering 8th grade in the fall.

As always, I want to thank Mr. Andy Greenberg for his passion and love of sharing not only his personal experiences with the students, but as Parker Luka states so eloquently “He cares deeply about his students, he makes sure if you have a suggestion or if the way he's teaching isn't right for you, he will modify his teaching to meet your needs. “ I look forward to continuing to be a part of this program and helping to assure that this program will touch the lives of many teens in the future.
